The Nathan Pattison Story

“1849 Rachel E. Pattison. Aged 18 June 19, 1849”

Nine words carved on a flat stone along the Road to Oregon at Ash Hollow in the southwestern corner of Nebraska. Who was this young woman whose dreams ended on the lonely, wind swept plains in southwestern Nebraska? What of her family, was she married, if so who was her husband?

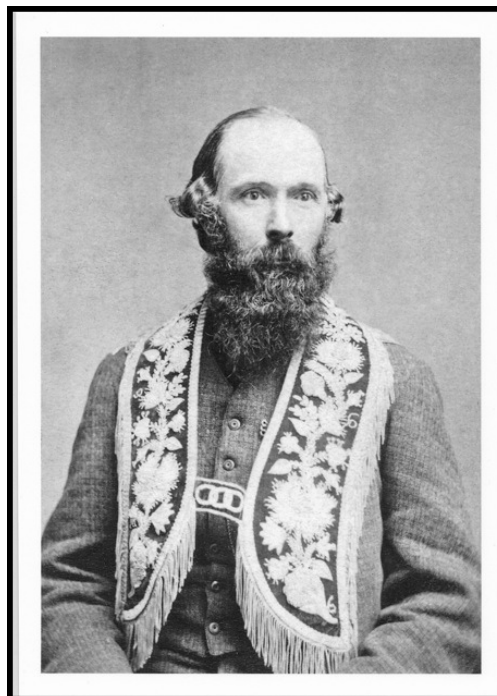
Other passing emigrants including J. Goldsborough Bruff mentioned the marker in their diaries. Some speculated *“that she was with a Missouri wagon train bound for California”*. The “4” in the first “1849” (see following photo) is backwards leading researchers to believe Bruff added those numerals during his trip west in 1849 because he typically wrote the “4 backwards”. Furthermore, the Pattisons were known as “educated people” who would never chisele the “4” backwards. A few years later another emigrant died nearby and was buried beside *“the girl named Pattison”*.

Over the next 100 years, the area was settled and the land around Rachel’s grave soon became the Ash Hollow Cemetery. The 1849 marker by the Platte River was the extent of what was known about Rachel for many years. Then in 1946, a Pattison descendant thought he may be related. W.W. Morrison of Cheyenne, Wyoming, began a personal quest to learn if he was related to the girl named Pattison. Over the next several years, he wrote to numerous Pattisons in California, Oregon and Washington. His effort finally led him to Olympia. In 1954, with the help of those Pattison descendants he was able to confirm his relationship and more importantly learn the rest of Rachel’s story.

Rachel Pattison was born Rachel E. Warren on March 25, 1831 in Randolph County, Illinois. There, on April 3, 1849, she married Nathan Pattison, the second of six sons of William and Mary Pattison. Eight days later the family of 14 left for Oregon in three covered wagons.

The company reached Ash Hollow six weeks later on June 18th. The day before, they lost three oxen that had eaten poisonous weeds. As a result William planned an early stop to do some wagon repair work and to harness four mules to take the place of the missing oxen.

Tragedy struck at Ash Hollow. William Pattison noted in his diary for June 19th, “. . . about 11 ocl Rachel was taken with Colara and died by 11 at night of 19 instant Medical aid was obtained from a train from Mechigan of the Dr Ormsby after burying on the left side of the hollow as you go round the bluff up the River on the second bank placing a grave stone at her head Rachel Pattison aged 18 June 19th 1849.”

The Pattisons continued on to Oregon where they lived until 1852 when the family moved north to the Olympia area. In 1860, most of the family moved back to Oregon. Nathan, who never remarried, and his brother James and his family remained in Thurston County. All total the Pattisons claimed more than 2000 acres of land on Chambers Prairie near the lake bearing their name.

Nathan's name appears on an Indian War Muster Roll, January 31, 1856, in Captain Isaac Hayes's Company E, first regiment. "The History of the Odd Fellows in Washington 1880" shows Nathan Pattison was initiated into the Odd Fellows in October 1871 and received the "Grand Lodge Degree" in 1877. Nathan also appears on the Roster of the Columbia Engine Company No. 1, Olympia's early fire department. Nathan died September 30, 1893, and was interred in the Odd Fellows Cemetery in Tumwater. His obituary begins with "Another Pioneer Called to His Last Home" and notes that he was "known and esteemed by everybody in Thurston County". According to the obituary Nathan's health had been failing but his death was sudden and unexpected.

In 1995, the Oregon-California Trails Association (OCTA) placed a plaque alongside Rachel's headstone at Ash Hollow. The plaque briefly told Rachel's story. OCTA member Bob Kabel has procured funding for a similar plaque to be placed alongside Nathan's headstone. With the dedication of the plaque the Rachel Pattison story will be complete.

The plaque dedication is tentatively planned for the early fall of 2012. All interested in this part of our heritage are invited to attend the dedication. 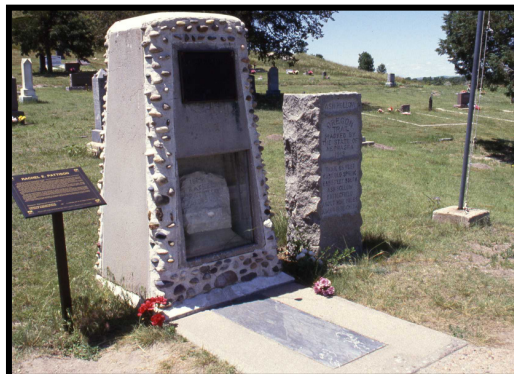


Pictured on the right is Nathan Pattison's headstone in the family plot at the Odd Fellows Cemetery in Tumwater,

The Maytown Fire July 28, 1925

Around 1910, Joseph Shelley platted a town site named Maytown in south Thurston County, and a few years later Mr. Taylor built a sawmill there. The town started to grow with the logging, mill and railroad operations. Mr. Taylor was killed in a railroad accident, and the mill changed hands several times in the next ten years. George Simpson of Shelton purchased the Maytown mill around 1923 or 1924. He decided the mill was unprofitable, shut down the mill, but kept the logging and railroad operations to supply other area mills.

My grandfather Ora Bates worked in the Maytown mill. In 1913, Ora married my grandmother Iva Watson McClellan when she was a young widow with two children, Gladys and Earl. Ora and Iva had three children in Maytown, Clark, my mother Veda, and Buel. The family lived in company housing built by the mill.

After George Simpson shut down the Maytown mill, Ora found work as a pond man directing logs into holding ponds at the White Star Lumber Company mill, located near Elma, Washington. On 25 Aug 1924, Ora "slipped on slick log and fell striking head" according to the Fatal Accident Report. He died two weeks later on 11 Sep 1924, leaving Iva a widow for the second time, now with five children to support. Gladys and Earl left school and got jobs to help support the family. Iva found work cooking for the Maytown mill, which had reopened after the mill was purchased by investors. George Simpson sued the new owners for payment he said was due him and won the lawsuit. In July of 1925 George Simpson repurchased the mill.

"FIRE RAZES MAYTOWN" was the Morning Olympian headline that greeted Thurston County the morning of 29 Jul 1925. "Swept by a roaring mass of flames, the Maytown mill was totally destroyed, nine homes and ten bunkhouses were razed, and over forty people were left homeless by a blaze which caused an estimated loss of nearly \$100,000 at Maytown last night. Efforts of a bucket brigade aided by a stream from a railroad tank car were responsible for saving most of the homes and the stores of the mill town."

"The fire started shortly before 6 p.m. when sparks from the open slab fire ignited dry sawdust in the mill. In a few minutes the mill was a sheet of flames it was declared by employees. The fire roared through the plant and yards, fanned by a stiff breeze and quickly was threatening the houses of the town. ... Two houses were dynamited to stop the progress of the fire. While the fire kept advancing the furniture and personal belongings of the workers were removed from the homes and the occupants prepared to flee to safety."

"The mill was the property of George Simpson, who purchased it last week from J. L. Jackson. ... Besides the plant, 550,000 feet of lumber in the yards was destroyed. The loss is partly covered by insurance it was said."



Adding to their misfortunes, the Bates house was one of the houses dynamited. When the fire broke out, the family quickly moved their household goods out of the house to a vacant lot, and then Iva and 18 year-old Earl joined the bucket brigade to fight the fire. Ten year-old Clark, eight year-old Veda and seven year-old Buel were left to guard their possessions. Looters came and tried to steal their things. My mother Veda remembered beating her head on the ground in fear and frustration at the terrible situation. Finally someone told Iva to come back and care for her young children, who were frantic. After the fire, George Shelley offered the family refuge in a house he owned in Maytown.

On the next day, the Morning Olympian reported that the rebuilding of the lumber mill was doubtful. "Maytown, with its only industrial enterprise destroyed by fire, is threatened with abandonment as a result of the announcement by mill officials yesterday that there is a possibility that the mill will not be rebuilt". The Salvation Army set up relief headquarters in the town and provided food and some clothing to the homeless. The mill was not rebuilt, and the population of Maytown rapidly declined. Today little remains of the once-bustling mill town.

With the help of a small Washington State Industrial Insurance pension from Ora's accidental death, Iva and her family stayed in Maytown for a few more years, moving to Olympia around 1929. Iva Bates, the resilient survivor of many tragedies throughout her life, died peacefully at the age of 95 in Olympia.

Information for this story came from a Maytown History written by Bernadine Dafoe, the Morning Olympian of July 29-30, 1925, and interviews with my mother Veda Bates Davis.

The Cutlers and the Bigelows

Edna Cutler Peebles has done extensive research on her branch of the Cutler Family, and as the result was accepted into the Daughters of the American Revolution. It was during this project that Edna noticed the large number of times the families of Cutler and Bigelow meet up on her collateral lines and she has tried to find a connection to the local pioneer family of Daniel Bigelow.

Following the links from the Olympia Historical Society's Pioneer Index listing for Daniel R. Bigelow to the Bigelow Society page on Samuel Bigelow (1653-1732) <http://bigelowsociety.com/rod/samuel2.htm>, we find listed as his first child, John (1675-1769), who we can follow to Daniel R. Bigelow (**Jotham**⁶ **BIGELOW**, **Joel**⁵ **Jotham**⁴, **John**³, **Samuel**², **John**¹) through Samuel's 7th child, Abigail (1687-?) who married Jonathan Cutler (1688-1746) the younger brother of Thomas (1677/78-1718) Edna Peebles' direct ancestor. (See the preceding Family Group Sheet for Lt. Thomas Cutler (1648-1722))

This is all rather complex, but there is indeed a connection between the local Bigelow family and Edna Cutler Peebles' collateral line starting with the children of Lt. Thomas Cutler and Samuel Bigelow way back in the 17th and 18th centuries.

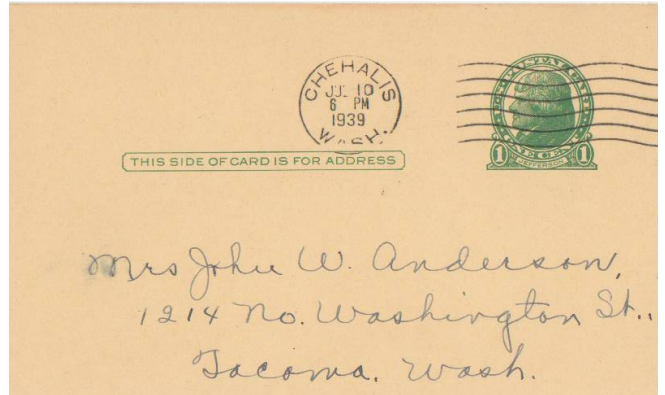
