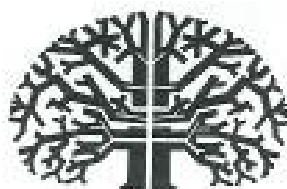

Friderich Christian Bendahl
Biography of the 20th of April 1817
Nykoebing on Zealand

I had always been curious about Dad's family because his mother died before I was born and his father, who lived 672 miles away, died when I was in high school. So I was thrilled when the internet started providing easier access to databases. Dad's sister-in-law had kept in touch with family in Denmark and had told me that his paternal grandmother's name was Ida Katinka Rudolphine. Hoping that this would be enough to find her, I went to the LDS genealogical website and sure enough, up popped an Ida Katinka Rudolphine Jentzsch. Jentzsch? That didn't look Danish and it wasn't. The father listed was Rudolph August Jacob Jentzsch, born in Bellenstedt, Anhalt-Bernb, Saxony (Germany) but her mother, Anne Marie Frederikke Bendahl was Danish. Somewhat encouraged, I searched for Bendahl and several came up. The first one was born in Indonesia so I automatically passed him by and wrote down the information on all the rest. To my amazement, every single one of them was descended from the one I had passed over – Friderich Christian Bendahl, born on the island of Java, Indonesia. Having unearthed all the information available on the LDS website, I searched for Bendahl on several different sites, including GenForum but found nothing. As a last resort, I posted on the Denmark page in GenForum and a few days later was contacted by a man in Denmark who had done some searching for Jentzches and Bendahls, reporting census data on Friderich Bendahl and also on one of his sons. About a week later he emailed Friderich's story to me – in Danish. A few weeks later I was telling this story to a woman at a PTA convention when a woman who had emigrated from Denmark overheard me and said she would translate it for me. What follows is Friderich's story as told to and recorded by his nephew.

Friderich Christian Bendahl was born in about 1745 (1741) in Benda, Java, Indonesia. His story is best told in his own words:

Here has my readers a real biography about the man, who after several hard incidents, by strange coincident was saved and brought to Denmark by Captain Hielte, and at an age of 20 years the 15th of May 1765 was christened by the Very Reverend Sir Lemming in Saint Nicolai church in Copenhagen, and was named Friderich Christian.

This is his own story.

"I am born in a village called Benda on the island of Java, which is one among Asia's surrounding islands, where especially the Dutch had colonies. My father was born there too, and he had a position, as we in my language called "Ketura". In English a chairman or foreman. My mother was also born on the same island and in the same village. We were 3 children one son and two daughters. I was the oldest, around 20 years after the new system, as we used the old system (?????). My parents and sisters were already dead, when I left my country.

As soon I was old enough to contribute to make a living, my father set me to look for the livestock. I had this job until my I was 15, when I came out sailing with my uncle, who owned a vessel. I have made 2 lucky journeys with him, and we set out on the 3rd journey bound for Palambang to make business. On this trip we were struck by a strong storm which during the night drove the ship aground on a rock in the middle of the ocean. The ship was wrecked on the rock. We were 8 people onboard, of which 6 were gone, including my uncle. They were presumably drowned. One sailor and I saved our lives by clinging onto wreckage. We survived the night in this way and in the morning we drifted on to the coast of the little island Lucepera. It is 2 3/4 mile from Sumatra and 5 miles from Bauca. (*Whether he talks about nautical or Danish miles I am not sure. 1 nautical mile are 1.856 kilometre and 1 Danish mile is 7.6 kilometre*). There were no people on the island, and we suffered from hunger and thirst, so we immediately started to search for water, which we found, but we didn't get any food for the first 3 days.

On the island we found a tree called bamboo, from which we made a fire by rubbing two pieces of tree against one another. We maintained this fire by always gathering firewood. We also made fires in others places on the island to make sure that always one fire was lit, if for some reason the others got extinct. We searched the beach each day and found eggs, turtles, birds and fishes, which were trapped in holes when the tide changed. They got roasted and we sustained our lives in that way.

The first 3 nights we slept on the sand close to the beach, but later the chilled nights drove us further inland, where we found a hollow tree, which served us as shelter and bed. We waited all days with great longing and hoped that a ship should pass our island so we could get saved, but faith was unfavourable to us.

After 3 weeks on the island, we decided to build a raft of timber. We set off from the island in the hope that the wind and current should lead us to an inhabited island or a ship, by which we could be saved. We drifted around for 3 days and nights in danger at sea without getting rescue any closer. The last night at sea the raft stopped, and we thought that we had reached land, but in the night we couldn't see what the land was like, nevertheless we left the raft and went ashore. It was first thing next morning we could see our misfortune, as we were stranded on a barren rock, which stood in the middle of the ocean, and there were no trees or anything else. Our raft was gone and we saw no rescue.

In this misery we discovered the island we had left, and we estimated that it was no further away than we could swim back, even though we were exhausted. So we decided to give it a try, and jumped into the sea and swam. We are used to swimming from early childhood. We got back very tired but happy, and started to sustain our lives as before.

My comrade, which was somewhat older than me, couldn't stand the hard work and began to become ill. I had to seek food for both of us and often also at night. This hard life took more and more of my time. As the illness became worse, he left me. I brought him food as often as possible. For 2 days I checked his condition before I went to search for food, but the third day I cooked and brought him the food, but to my great sorrow I found him dead. I cried and felt suddenly very lonely.

We had survived for 3 months on this island. I was now alone and continued to sustain my life, but longing and fear began to take nearly all of my sleep and doubled my sufferings. I saw several ships pass the island on great distance, but had no hope of being rescued by them.

After one more month alone providence was mild to me and sent a ship to my rescue. One morning as I stood and grilled some fish, I saw something unusual moving between the waves. I became both happy and afraid. I feared that it was a ghost, as I have had several dreams about ghosts since my comrade died. I was happy to realise that it for real was something by which I could be rescued.

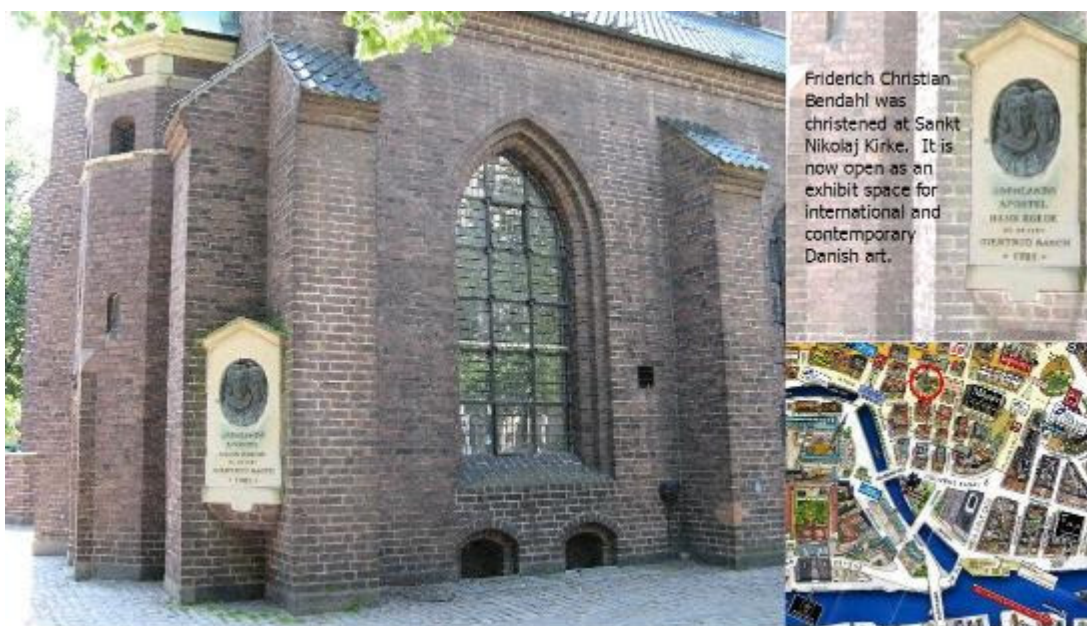
I ran immediately out on the beach, where my hope was strengthening as it still came closer. I could now see a boat with crew onboard. I could see myself leaving this lousy kingdom of mine and looked forward to a better life in my thoughts. I yelled and screamed, but they didn't come all up on the beach, as they might have thought that the island was inhabited and that we maybe would attack them. I had a bamboo stick with eggs, which I threw into the boat. They might have thought that I with a firing-stick with gunpowder in it would blow their boat apart and therefore hesitated in letting me get onboard. As they got convinced that I was alone, and they saw that I didn't tried to harm them, they allowed me onboard.*

They were Danish people, sent out from the ship "Prinz Friderich" of Denmark to make soundings in the area. I came back to the ship together with the boat, and found in the Captain Niels Olsen Hielte a Christian and honourable man, who saw to it that I got all the care I needed.

The day I came to the ship, the 7th of April 1762, was reason for them to call me "April". As I was unable to speak or understand Danish, I expressed what had happened to me with gesticulations. As I was rescued on their way to China, they taught me the alphabet, to reckon and read a little. The 18th of July 1763 the Captain started my thorough education in Christianity and the 15th of May 1765 I was christened in Saint Nicolai church in Copenhagen under the Very Reverend Sir Lemming, and was named Friderich Christian Bendahl. Friderich Christian Bendahl is now living in the provincial town Nykoe-bing Zeeland."

From the front-page of "Kjøbenhavnske Tidende" ("The Copenhagen Times") the 17th of May 1765: "It is hard to translate because it is written in the language of the 17th century, but I have tried as good as I can. It was a tradition to christen "found" and motherless male children after the king. Almost every king in Denmark is called either Christian or Frederik ("Friderich"). I don't know all the persons mentioned in the newspaper, but from the last names of the gentlemen it is easy to see that they were important persons from the 17th century Copenhagen. There was also a lot of prestige in it for the navy, and that is probably why so many of the godfathers were captains." . . .Anker Østrup

On the 15th of the month, in St. Nicolay Church here in this City was born, in the 20th year of his age, a male person, born on the island of Java, by pagan Parents, brought hereto by Captain Hielte. His very reverend Mr. Lemming, performed the act of Birth and held a sermon linked to the words of 1. Petr.2.9.10. After he confessed his faith he was christened as Friderich Christian. His godfathers were: Captain Mr. Hans Georg Krog, Mr. Champerlain Rabech, Mr. Consumption-scribe Knud Jacobsen Lyne, Mr. Captain Knud Christian Ytrecht, Mr. Captain Jesper With, Mr. Quartermaster of the Regiment Mr. Niels Aagensen, Mr. Captain Robert Pheiff, Mr. Captain Holm, Mr. Shippainter Henrich Wegersløv, Mr. Supercargo Søren Lodse, Mr. Bailiff of the City Bechmand, Mr. Lawyer Balling, Mr. ["Mundtmester"] Knoph, Dr. J.E. Hvasleff, Principal at the navy Mr. Captain Niels Olsen Hielte."

Friderich worked for a time in the palaces in Copenhagen. On May 27, 1785 he married Marie Malene Jensdatter at Sankt Nicolaj Kirke, Copenhagen. She was born about 1756 (1761). Two years later he purchased a home with a garden. They had seven children: Christian, Søren, Jørgen, Frederikke, Christen and Jacob. He died 8 November 1817 and was buried 10 November 1817 in Nykøbing, Sjælland, Denmark. Marie died 11 December 1828 in Nykøbing.

Friderich and Marie's granddaughter Anne Bendahl married Jens/Johan Jentzsch, a Jewish furrier who owned a hat & fur shop on what is now the most expensive street in Copenhagen. Their daughter Ida worked in the shop. Ida married a Casper Wilhelm Hansen, a merchant. They had six children. The first born was Carl Otto Rasmus Hansen, my grandfather.

I have not been able to find the Hansen family members in Denmark and the family members in the U.S. are all gone so I have not been able to learn why Carl emigrated to North Dakota in 1904 and built a homesteader's cabin not far from Flaxton. Gaining his U.S. citizenship in 1910, he then returned to Denmark, where he married Johanne Christine Friderika Hein. The couple sailed from Copenhagen on the S.S. C.F. Tietgen, arriving at Ellis Island on the 25th of May, 1911. Carl moved the cabin into town and, being a carpenter, added onto it until it was an integral part of the larger house. My father was their second born.

A Transcription of the Log from "Prinz Friderich" of Denmark for the 7th of April 1762.

Wednesday 7th. In the morning at 9 AM the first mate From stood out with the dinghy in order to take soundings in the waters between Luceperra and Sumatra. When the dinghy due to the current drifted much to far east, there was set a signal under the top of the mizzen mast, that he should get back onboard, which first happen at half past 5 PM. It was at this coincident us was given a strange example on the divine providence to save a human from misery and dead, whose time on earth is not yet expired. As the current had drifted the dinghy so far east along the coast of Luceperra, the crew onboard could hear a very miserable yelling and screaming from a human. It touched them to close the coast even more, to be certain weather it was a human, when it then came swimming out towards them. It turned out to be a Malay boy, about 12 or 13 years of age, which with gestures tried to express, that he was alone and had nothing to eat, and therefore asked to be taken with them back to the ship, which happen. When he was onboard the captain asked him how he ended up on this little island. He answers with gestures and with some word, which the captain understood. He had together with some others been out fishing with a Prauwe, which by a strong gust had capsized with all of them, and he was by the current drifted in on the island, where he had been for 3 days, weeks or months, which we could not fully understand.

He had some turtle eggs with him in a stick of bamboo. The eggs were cooked in the hot sand by the heat of the sun. He was almost naked, except for an old red clothe of calico, by which he hid his nakedness. We could understand from him that he came from the island Banca, and that all his earlier comrades had drowned.

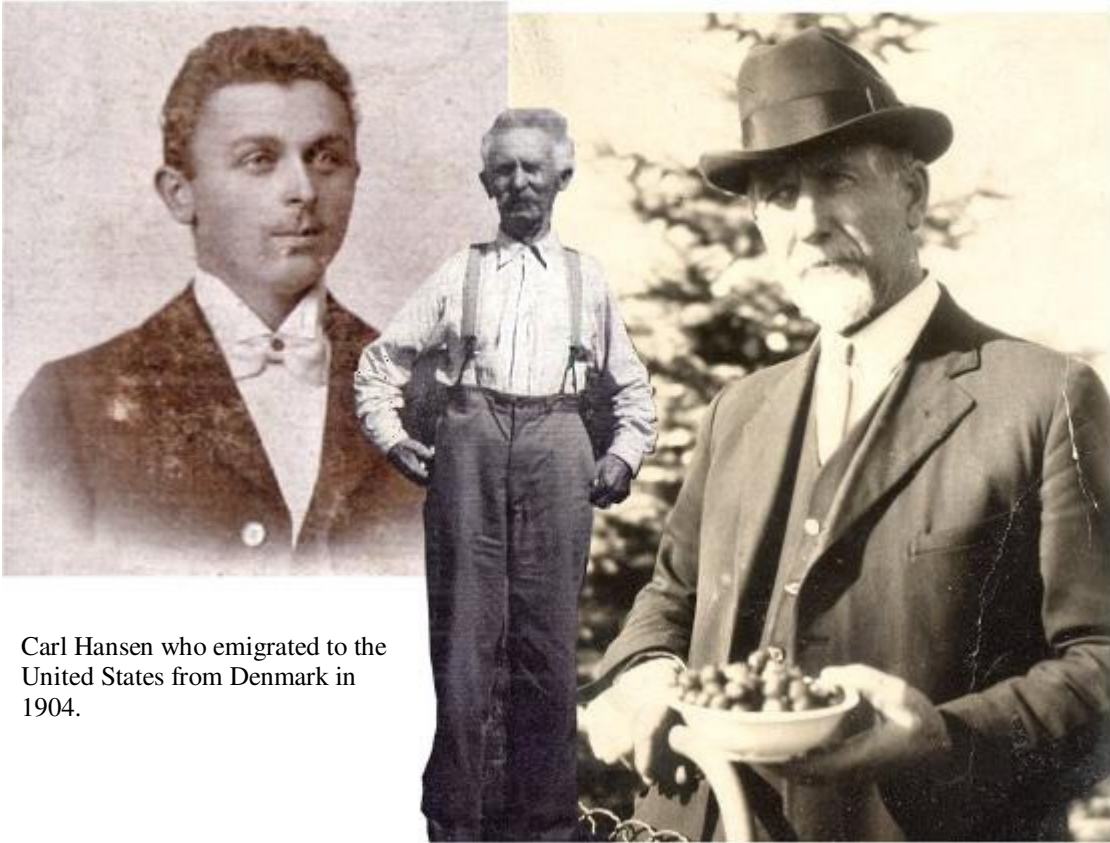

Weirs and Woods Winter 2012. Machiasport, Maine. Donated by Roger Newman. Article on the Worcesters of Columbia from the Machias Union 1876 includes other early Pleasant River families.

Mason Log, Mason County Washington May 2012. A helpful article on the Donation Land Claim Act which covered 1850-1855 in Idaho, Washington and Oregon. There is much information on it at the Olympia Library in the genealogy collection. If you are female and have an ancestor with a Donation Land Claim you are eligible to join Daughters of the Pioneers of Wash. Just thought I'd throw that in!

Mason Log June 2012. BOOKS PUBLISHED BY OGS MEMBERS

Dear Brother and Sister:: Smith-Haviland-Caldwell Fourth Michigan Volunteer Infantry Civil War Letters compiled and annotated by Linda Glaza-Herrington. Family Genealogies compiled and edited by Diana (Glaza) Kodet, Virginia (Ambrose) Cummings and **Sylvia (Rossman) Richards**.

This summer I attended a memorial service for Deloss M. Haviland, a young man who had died at the age of 21. Deloss had died June 27, 1862, at the Battle of Gaines Mill in Virginia during the Civil War. His brother, Lewis, was wounded in the same battle, and witnessed the death of his brother. Lewis only had time to reach down and grab his brother's cap before he had to retreat from the relentless Confederate onslaught.

At least fifty-six letters were written back home to their families in Livingston County, Michigan. In 2009, the letters, now fading but still intact, came into the possession of Linda Glaza-Herrington, she decided to transcribe the letters so that they would be preserved for the descendants of Deloss, Lewis and Austin and also for future generations. As she did so, the three young soldiers came to life for her through their documentation of the time they had responded to President Lincoln's call for volunteers to help preserve the Union.

The project took a turn, as Linda decided to publish the letters in a book, along with a historical account of what was taking place in the country and in the families of the three young soldiers during this period in history. She enlisted the help of Diane (Glaza) Kodet, Virginia (Ambrose) Cummings and **Sylvia (Rossman) Richards**, all family genealogists and also descendants of one or more of the letter writers. Two and a half years later, **Dear Brother & Sister** was published in June of 2012. Lewis J. Haviland was my Great-grandfather, he was the only one of the three boys who wrote the letters to make it home alive. If anyone is interested you can go out to www.cousinsbooks.com to see a sample of what the book is like.

Our Hulshizer Heritage: Being the Descendants of Sigmond Holtzhausser (1655-1750) of Ilsfeld and Merklingen, Württemberg, Germany, through his son Johann Martin Hulshizer (1710-1792) of Merklingen, Württemberg, Germany, and Hunterdon County, New Jersey by **Jerri (Thorpe) McCoy**. This Johann Martin Hulshizer was the immigrant ancestor of my Hulshizer ancestors, and came to America in 1752. I also include his father and grandfather's generations in Germany, and then bring the family line down to my grandmother Osborn, who was born a Hulshizer. It is in Modified Register format.

Our Osborn Heritage: Being the Descendants of Thomas Osborn (1594-1688) Of Ashford, Co. Kent, England, New Haven, Connecticut, and East Hampton, New York by **Jerri (Thorpe) McCoy**. This Thomas Osborn was the immigrant ancestor of my Osborn ancestors, and came to America in 1637. I also include two earlier generations in England, and then bring the family line down to my grandfather Osborn. It is in Modified Register format.

Glad our Paths Crossed : reflections of a doctor's wife and settling in Forest Grove, Oregon by Eva Cherrington Waltz, 1899-1994. Edited by **Steven Waltz Morrison**. Contains the personal history of Eva Cherrington Waltz in her own words. Includes brief genealogical information about her ancestors and descendants.

My Space on Earth by Irene Florence Paddock Ivory. Transcribed and edited by **Gayle (Ivory) Strom**.

Irene Paddock Ivory, born in 1912, loved to tell stories about her life on the many trips to her childhood home in Kneeland, California. Her daughter listened so many times and kept suggesting that Irene should write her stories down. It took twelve years of back and forth to get the many stories of her youth in print.

Your James & Wood Ancestors by **Lee A. James**

Earlier this year I self-published the family history book that I have been working on for the past twenty years. I did not wait to start writing until I had assembled all the data - using a word processing program, I started writing when I started doing the genealogical research. Additions and corrections could therefore be handled easily over the years. The book ended up with about 700 pages (printed on both sides), including over 100 pages of photographs, maps, and documents, and about 1000 reference citations. I self-printed using an ink-jet printer and acid-free archival paper. The binding was done by the Puget Bindery in Kent. The book was distributed to family members, as well as the Library of Congress, the Allen County Public Library, the LDS Family History Library, the DAR National Library, the New England Historic Genealogical Society Library, the Society of Mayflower Descendants Library, and the Czechoslovak Genealogical Society Library.
